College Chaplain's Message

With God's Grace we have reached the midpoint of Great and Holy Lent. This, the third Sunday of Lent is dedicated to the Veneration of the Holy Cross. The Gospel reading for the day is taken from the Gospel of Mark (8:34-9:1).

In the Gospel reading, Jesus invites people to active discipleship saying, "Whoever desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me."

The love of God is evident from the outset as Jesus does not impose His will on people, but rather, respecting our free will, He invites whoever wishes to follow Him to a life of discipleship through the forsaking of one's own will and aligning it to God's will.

However, His next statement about carrying one's cross would have brought dread upon His listeners because they knew well that to carry one's cross meant one would be crucified, and crucifixion was a horrible execution reserved for the worst criminals. Still, Jesus invites His disciples throughout the ages to take up their cross and follow Him.

And so, when we think of the cross, we are faced with this paradox, this mystery of intertwined tragedy and of victory. The cross, an instrument of infamous death, of punitive death to which criminals were doomed - because Christ's death was that of an innocent, and because this death was a gift of self in an act of love - becomes victory and triumph.

This is why Saint Paul could say, "It is no longer I, it is Christ Who lives in me." Divine love filled him to the brim, and therefore there was no room for any other thought or feeling, any other approach to anyone apart from love, a love that gave itself unreservedly: love sacrificial, love crucified, but love exulting in the joy of life.

So, when we read in the Gospel, "deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow Me", we are not called to something dark and frightening; we are told by God: "Open yourself to love! Do not remain a prisoner of your own self-centeredness". We are called to sacrifice our often selfish desires on the cross that God has given to us for our salvation. We are reminded by Saint Theophan the Recluse to not be, "like a shaving of wood which is rolled around its own emptiness." We are challenged to open ourselves up so that we can see that there is so much to love, there are so many to love! There are so many ways in which love can be expressed, experienced, and fulfilled and accomplished. We ought to open ourselves up and love because this is the way of the Cross!

So, when we venerate the Cross, when we think of Christ's crucifixion, when we hear the call of Christ to deny ourselves - and these words simply mean: turn away from ourselves! Take up your cross - we are called to open ourselves to the flood of Divine Love that is expressed in the cross that God allows in His wisdom for our salvation, love that is both death to ourselves and openness to God, as well as to each and to all.

Let us learn to embrace the Cross of Christ in our lives. Let us learn to give thanksgiving to God for the crosses He lays on our shoulders, knowing that the cross is the key that opens paradise for each of us. Let us learn the glory of crucified Love, of this sacrificial Love which is, in the words of the Old Testament, "stronger than death, stronger than hell," stronger than all things because it is Divine Life conquering us and poured through us onto all those who need to be loved in order to come to Life, to believe in Love, and themselves to become children of Love, children of Light, to inherit Life eternal.

Careers News

UAC Applications are open

UAC applications for study at university in 2025 are now open for students.

Details of Semester 1 2025 courses offered by UAC's participating institutions are available on the UAC website.

Starting an application: essential information

This year, students need the following details to start their UAC application:

Personal email address: For security reasons, when students start their application they will need to register with a personal email address and a password.

Year 12 student number and UAC PIN: UAC emailed UAC PINs to NSW students yesterday using the email addresses NESA and ACT BSSS have on file. If any students didn't receive this email, please <u>call</u>UAC

Students need to enter their Year 12 student number and UAC PIN early in the application. These details identify them as a 2024 Year 12 student, which means they'll be able to apply for an early offer through the Schools Recommendation Scheme.

Unique Student Identifier (USI): At the request of institutions, this is now a mandatory field for domestic applicants who are Australian citizens. Students can quickly and easily **create their USI or check if they already have one**.

How to apply through UAC

- 1. Create your UAC account using a personal email address and a password. You'll be sent an email to validate your account.
- 2. Select your citizenship.
- 3. If you're a 2024 Year 12 student, enter your Year 12 student number. Your UAC PIN was emailed to the address you registered with NESA on 3 April 2024.
- 4. Enter your personal details, including:

a. your name (the name on your application must match the name on your official ID, otherwise you'll have problems when you enrol)

b. a personal email address (don't use a school address – it will expire)

c. your Unique Student Identifier (USI) (a government-issued student reference number that you need to enrol at an institution and get HECS-HELP or FEE-HELP – <u>apply</u> for a USI or check if you already have one).

5. Provide details of your studies.

6.Select up to **five** course preferences.

7.Accept the applicant declaration.

8.Pay for your application with a credit card (Mastercard or Visa) or PayPal account. 2024 Year 12 students can also pay using BPAY. Your application is **not complete** until you have paid.



9. Check your email regularly for updates on your application.

Once you've applied, you can change the order of your preferences – or even the courses you've selected – as often as you like before the closing dates for each offer round.

Some courses have early application closing dates so check for these as well. You can't change your preferences by phone, letter or email.

With this in mind, we have constructed a keyboard lab, accessible to students from Years 6 to 9 at this time. This innovative facility serves as a central hub for honing piano skills, providing every student with the opportunity to explore the world of music firsthand. Our commitment to holistic education is illustrated in our efforts to empower students with the tools they need to thrive academically and emotionally.

In conjunction with the establishment of the keyboard lab, we have modified the music curriculum to include keyboard lessons from Years 6 to 9. By embedding piano education into our curriculum, we aim to cultivate a generation of well-rounded individuals with enhanced cognitive abilities and emotional resilience. Through consistent practice and collaboration in the keyboard lab, students will not only develop musical proficiency but also sharpen essential skills such as discipline, patience, and teamwork.

The keyboard lab initiative represents a significant investment in the future of the Music Department and of our students, providing them with a platform to explore their creativity and express themselves through music. As students progress through the piano curriculum, they not only expand their musical horizons but also develop a deeper appreciation for the arts.
