#### **Christmas Drive**



# **Deputy Principal's Report - Primary**

#### **Kindergarten Transition**





For the second transition session on Tuesday 12 November, the students engaged in a delightful literacy and creative arts session centered around the story 'Ducks Away'. They read the story together, which not only entertained but also encouraged early comprehension and language skills. The students then sang the nursery rhyme Five Little Ducks, which helped reinforce counting skills and sequencing in a fun, rhythmic way. Afterward, they created an art piece inspired by the story, using paper craft and various shapes to design their own ducks. This hands-on activity supported fine motor skills, creativity, and shape recognition as the students carefully cut, arranged, and glued pieces to bring their ducks to life.

At the same time, the parents met with Ms. Pappas for an informative session focused on supporting their children's literacy and numeracy development. Ms. Pappas shared insights into the literacy curriculum, emphasising the role of phonics, vocabulary building, and comprehension as fundamental skills for young readers. In numeracy, Ms. Pappas highlighted the importance of foundational math skills, such as counting, pattern recognition, and basic operations. She provided tips for incorporating math into everyday routines, such as using household items for counting and sorting, engaging in pattern recognition activities, and encouraging simple addition and subtraction during playtime.

# College Chaplain's Message

On the Eighth Sunday of Luke our Holy Church recounts one of the most famous lessons from the Gospel: the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:15-37). Through this parable, we discover not only the love we must have for our neighbours, but also Christ's own mission to heal and save a world wounded by sin. Through this parable, we see both the compassionate heart of Christ, the "Good Samaritan" Who saves humanity, and our calling as Orthodox Christians to be "good Samaritans" - bearers of love, mercy and healing to others.

The parable begins with a simple but deeply moving story. A man was traveling from Jerusalem to Jericho when he was set upon by robbers, stripped, beaten, and left for dead by the side of the road. A priest and then a Levite - both respected religious figures - pass by the wounded man without stopping to help. It is only a Samaritan, a figure despised and considered unclean by the Jews, who stops to show compassion. He binds the man's wounds, takes him to an inn, and makes sure he will be taken care of until he recovers.

We may wonder: Why would Jesus use a Samaritan as a positive example in this parable given that Samaritans were considered as outcasts and viewed with suspicion and even hostility? Yet, Christ chose to make the Samaritan a symbol of love and compassion, someone who looks beyond divisions and societal prejudices to see the common humanity in the person suffering before him. By doing so, Jesus calls us to follow a higher law than that of human distinction and to embody mercy and love that reach beyond borders and classifications.

In the parable, the priest and the Levite who walk past the wounded man represent the 'religious' people who should have shown compassion but were, for whatever reason, unable to respond with mercy. Perhaps they feared becoming "unclean" by touching a bloody, injured man. Yet, here we see that such rituals and self-imposed limitations are shattered by the boundless mercy that Christ exemplifies. Jesus shows us that the true fulfillment of the Law is not found in strict observance without compassion but in love that is ready to sacrifice itself for others.

And here, we come to the heart of the parable. The Good Samaritan, who shows such deep and self-less love, points us to none other than Jesus Christ Himself. For we, humanity, are like the wounded traveller, beaten and bruised by sin, bound up in selfishness, anger, and fear, separated from God. Humanity was robbed of its beauty and purity by the fall of Adam and Eve, wounded by pride, and left to suffer in darkness. Yet, our compassionate Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, in His great mercy, comes to us as the Good Samaritan. He does not pass by or ignore us. Instead, He comes near, bends down to our lowly state, carries our burden and binds our wounds with His love.

Through His Incarnation, Christ took on our human nature, humbling Himself to experience our pain, sorrow, and mortality. He heals our wounds through His sacrifice on the Cross. As the Samaritan poured wine and oil on the man's wounds, Christ poured out His Blood to wash away our sins and gave us the Holy Spirit through the sacrament of Holy Unction, the oil of gladness, to sanctify us. He took upon Himself the cost of our healing, bringing us to the "inn" - His Church, where we find rest, hope, and continual healing through the sacraments.

This parable is not simply a moral lesson on kindness; it is a revelation of Christ's love for us and His desire to heal us from the wounds of sin. Christ, the true Physician, binds our wounds with forgiveness, feeds us with the Bread of Life, and strengthens us with the grace of the Holy Spirit. And in turn, as recipients of His mercy, we are called to follow His example and become "good Samaritans" to others.

So, how can we live this calling as Orthodox Christians? The parable calls us to a life of active, sacrificial love. Our faith is not just about personal salvation; it is about manifesting Christ's love to a world that is hurting, broken, and in need of God's mercy. Every person we encounter, regardless of their background, faith, or status, is our neighbour. We must be willing to look past differences, past grievances, past discomfort, and see the image of God in each person.

We live in a world filled with "wounded travellers" - people weighed down by poverty, loneliness, despair, and sin. Just as the Samaritan reached out to help, we too must extend ourselves to those in need. We can do this by listening to the lonely, comforting the sorrowful, forgiving those who wrong us, and sharing our resources with those in need. To be a "good Samaritan" is not only giving physical aid, but also spiritual companionship, kindness, and respect to every person we meet.

In the Orthodox Christian life, the ultimate act of healing and mercy is to draw others closer to Christ. We must invite people into the "inn" - the Church, where they can encounter the loving embrace of Christ, just as we have. Let us pray for the strength to carry Christ's love into the world, to shine with His light, and to be sources of healing for others. Let us embrace our calling to be neighbours to all, offering a listening ear, a comforting word, and a helping hand.

As we reflect on this message, let us recognize the Good Samaritan Who has already come to save us - our Lord Jesus Christ. And may we, allow His love to work through us, so that we too can become like Him, reaching out to heal the wounds of our suffering brothers and sisters.
