Celebrating Oxi Day

This Monday, October 28th, we came together to celebrate Oxi Day, a day of national pride and reflection. "Oxi," meaning "no" in Greek, marks the day in 1940 when Greece rejected an ultimatum from Axis forces, standing up with courage and unity against occupation. In Greece and amongst our Greek community in Australia, this day serves as a powerful reminder of resilience and patriotism.

Our College marked Oxi Day at our parish church St Euphemia and at the Cathedral of the Annunciation of Our Lady with wreath laying ceremonies and poetry recitals. Our students in both the Primary School and Secondary School held special assemblies that honoured this history, celebrating the spirit of standing firm for our values.

Preparing for Exam Success

3. Take Regular Breaks

Studies show that short breaks can improve focus and memory. Try studying in 25- to 50-minute blocks with 5- to 10-minute breaks in between.

Don't hesitate to reach out to teachers, classmates, or family members if you need help with a topic. Sometimes, explaining or discussing concepts can reinforce your understanding. 6. **Practise with Past Papers**

Practising with past exam papers can be a great way to get familiar with the format and types of questions that might appear, giving you a feel for time management as well.


Opening of New Playground

College Chaplain's Message

The Gospel reading for the Seventh Sunday of Luke (Luke 8:41-56) recounts two of Jesus' miracles.

Jesus was in a certain village and many people had gathered around Him. They had possibly heard of His healings, His stilling of the storm or His wise teachings. Perhaps they too had come to ask Him for help or guidance. They had gathered in such numbers that Saint Luke records Saint Peter saying that they were crushing against Jesus.

In this crowd, two people are given special mention. One was Jairus and the other was a lady who had been suffering from a flow of blood. Both of them stood out for their faith and both were rewarded by Jesus for their faith.

Jairus was one of the rulers of the synagogue. His only child, a daughter of about twelve, was at the point of death. Facing the reality of his daughter's mortality, he ran out to Jesus and asked Him to heal his daughter.

Whilst we see this as normal for a father, it is important to consider that many people were cautious of approaching Jesus, since many of the authorities had declared that anyone who confessed Jesus as the Saviour would be cast out of the synagogue. Jairus himself may have been one of these people. However, acknowledging Jesus' authority over the living and the dead, he approached humbly.

While Jesus was still conversing with Jairus, and about to make His way to his home, a lady pushed through the crowd to reach Jesus. She had suffered with a flow of blood for twelve years and had spent all of her livelihood on doctors, but alas, not only was she not cured, her health had become worse!

Seeing Jesus, she too braved the crowd in order to be healed. Although the Law of Moses considered her unclean and forbade her from being with other people lest they become ritually unclean, she approached Jesus knowing He would heal her. The throng of people meant she could not get close enough to speak to Him, but was able to just touch the hem of His garment. And the miracle happened! Immediately she was healed.

Knowing she was healed, Jesus asked who it was who touched Him. This was not because He did not know, but to offer the lady an opportunity to give glory to God. While Saint Peter said there was no way of knowing who touched Jesus, Jesus said that power had gone forth from Him.

Knowing that she could not hide, she proclaimed the whole truth. Jesus responded with "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace", showing that each person participates actively in the acquisition of Divine Grace.

There is no doubt that Jairus would have been encouraged by the lady's healing, but he was heartbroken when a messenger came to him saying that his daughter had died. Jesus immediately said, "she will be well".

When Jesus went to Jairus' home, the people were weeping. Despite Jesus saying she is not dead, they mocked Him, knowing that she had died. Jesus went into the room where she lay and raised her from the dead, restoring her to her family.

This Gospel account reveals Jesus as having power and authority over the living and the dead. Yet, while we marvel at God's wonders, let us reflect on the marvel of faith shown by Jairus and the woman. They were not afraid to put their trust in God. They were not afraid of people's opinions of them. They knew God would respond to their petition.

Let us then, cast off all doubt and fear, and place our hope and trust in God, knowing that He will give us comfort and consolation, and will grant us all that is good and beneficial for our souls.
